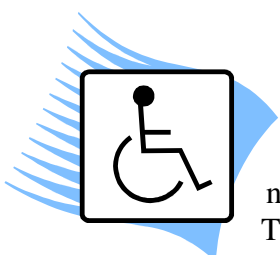
**Important Information Regarding Our MCAS Results**

The *No Child Left Behind (NCLB) Act of 2001* established national reading and math proficiency goals for all students to achieve by the 2013-2014 school year. In turn, each state has created curriculum standards and annual assessments that support these goals. In Massachusetts, we have *Curriculum Frameworks* and the *Massachusetts Comprehensive Assessment System (MCAS)*. Each year, all the districts and schools in the state administer MCAS to determine if *Adequate Yearly Progress (AYP)* has been made toward achieving the NCLB goals.

If the students in a school, or any subgroup of students in a school, miss the AYP goals for two consecutive years, the school is then identified for improvement. The 2011 AYP data indicates that subgroups within our school did not make the AYP for the last two years in English Language Arts. Therefore, Carver Elementary School has been placed on the state list under the category: Restructuring, Year 2, which means that we have to develop a plan for improvement. Our restructuring plan is included in our 2011-2012 School Improvement Plan

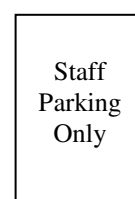

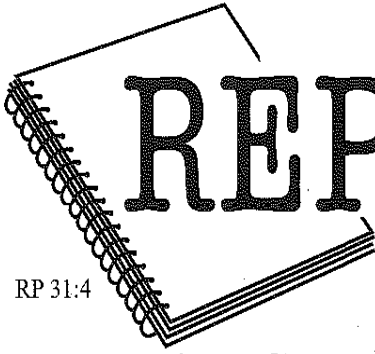

## Having Successful Parent-Teacher Conferences

It doesn't matter if you're the student, the teacher, or the parent, parent-teacher conferences are bound to cause some anxiety. Yet these one-on-one meetings are priceless opportunities for families to get a better understanding of their children. By preparing well for your meetings with teachers and following up with both your children and their teachers afterward, you can strengthen your children's school success.

### Before the Conference:

**Listen.** Any time you hear your child talking about something he or she is doing really well in or is having trouble with—either with school-work or with classmates—make a note of it. When it's time for the conference with the teacher, you'll have a ready-made list of things to discuss.

**Ask.** When it's time to schedule the conference with the teacher, sit down with your child and ask him or her what you should discuss with the teacher. Encourage your children to open up and tell you what it's like for them in the classroom. Do they feel like they're falling behind academically? Or are they bored because they understand the material that the rest of the class is struggling with? Are there any troubling issues with any of their classmates? One thing that's guaranteed to get your children to open up is asking them what they think their teacher is going to tell you about them.

**Bring notes and papers.** Write down questions you want to address with the teacher. Bring copies of any assignments you have questions about. Think ahead of time how to be tactful and kind in wording concerns you have about the teacher or the class.

### During the Conference:

**Be on time.** Schools tightly schedule parent-teacher conferences because there's only so much time available and dozens of families to see. Show up at least a few minutes early, so you know you'll be set to begin when it's your turn.

**Hire a babysitter.** It's important to make sure that the

time you have with the teacher is as productive as possible. Having other children in the room is distracting. Either hire a babysitter or trade off with another parent so that your children don't tag along.

**Take notes.** In addition to presenting the questions and concerns you brought to the meeting, make sure to take notes about what the teacher is telling you about your child. Be sure to address these important areas: strengths, weaknesses, and social skills.

**Keep emotions out of it.** It is always difficult to hear that your "angel" or "young Einstein" isn't exactly the person you thought he or she was in the classroom. Keep your cool and bear in mind that the teacher is offering constructive criticism.

### After the Conference:

**Talk to your child.** Sit down with your child and tell him or her what you and the teacher discussed. Emphasize the positive things the teacher said. Remember that it's important for your child to feel positive about

learning, the teacher, and the school.

**Follow up.** If there were important issues that need to be dealt with, such as finding a tutor or getting counseling for your child, make sure to follow up in writing with the teacher soon after the conference. Specify exactly what you discussed with the teacher, what steps will be taken, what your responsibilities and the school's responsibilities will be, and what the timetable is for action.

**Remember the principal.** If, after meeting with your child's teacher, you still feel like you have serious issues that weren't adequately addressed, set up a time to talk to the guidance counselor or principal to see what other options are available.

**Follow through.** Once you know what you can do at home to help your child succeed in school, make sure to actually do it. It's understandable that finding the time might be difficult, but remember—your child needs you.

## CARVER PTO

We hope that you are all settling in and getting used to schedules again!

The PTO has been working hard coming up with some fun events for this year. We are happy to invite all Primary & Elementary School students to our first **Halloween Event**. This will take place at the school, **Friday night, October 21, 2011 from 6:30 pm-8:30 pm**. The students will be able to trick or treat throughout the halls of the Primary Building. Admission to this event is one “non-perishable” food item that will be donated to a local food bank. We hope to see a lot of you there!

Below is a brief description of a few different programs we’re involved in to help raise money and supplies for our school. They are Box Tops for Education, Bags2School, Labels for Education and Target’s Take Charge for Education Programs.

### Box Tops For Education



With this program we collect the Box Tops label off participating products. We receive 10 cents for every label (with some special promotion labels worth more) we turn in. They **must** have a current expiration date on them to be turned in and counted. The school receives a check twice a year to spend on whatever it needs. We sponsor monthly classroom contests (whichever classroom collects the most box tops wins a prize for each student, from our Box Top mascot,

“Cocoa”. Collection sheets are sent home monthly with the due date noted on the sheet. You can always check our school’s progress at [www.boxtops4education.com](http://www.boxtops4education.com). Also this year, we are introducing/promoting the Box Top Marketplace where you can earn ebox tops for our school. More information on this will be coming home shortly.

***We are calling this contest the “Box Top Touchdown Competition” so let’s see which classroom is going to throw for a touchdown!!!***

We will schedule this event 3 times per school year, each collection day scheduled as a convenience for parents. **Labels for Education**



With this program we collect the UPC only off of various Campbell’s, BIC and other participating company’s products. UPC’s are worth 1 or 5 points (with some special ones worth 100 points special promotions). Point values are noted by UPC. These do not have expiration dates, with the exception of bonus certificates. Last year we purchased almost \$1500 worth of recess equipment with labels alone!

**Target’s Take Charge of Education**

**ON-GOING VOLUNTEER OPPORTUNITIES**

**Paper Recycling:** We implemented this program to teach the students about the importance of recycling and it has been very well received. At the end of each school day, we have committed to emptying the recycle bins in the classrooms and copy rooms. The more people that offer to help, the easier this task becomes. Please let us know if you would be willing to empty these bins one day after school (you would not have to do the entire school, you would only be assigned one of the buildings). ☺

**Juice Pouch Brigade:** We are not going to lie to you, this is a dirty job but an important one (we raised \$1,700 alone last year in just collecting these juice pouches-and kept over 85,000 pouches out of landfills). We have juice pouch receptacles placed at the end of each pod as well as in the cafeterias, these must be emptied twice a week (all are emptied into trash bags and you must make sure a new trash bag is in the receptacle). The juice pouches must be delivered to a residence in South Carver as we are sure that most volunteers are not going to want this lingering in his/her car for too long so please keep that in mind! ☺

*Both of the above volunteer opportunities provide a way for the students to become involved. Previous volunteers always included their children and the children really enjoyed helping and being part of supporting their school!*
